Last week's newsletter looked at the question of Bullying, and the way in which it has become over-used. By using the term 'bullying' for a range of behaviours, we create a 'boy who cried wolf' situation. This means that it becomes harder to address real issues when they arise. This doesn't benefit anyone.

When we consider resilience, and the need for children to develop this, we have a simple 'step' approach that children can use when something is happening that they don't like. It goes like this.

BUILDING RESILIENCE AT EVERGLADE SCHOOL

Children should develop the ability to 'stay confident and strong' (Kia Kaha!) when things happen that are not good.

It is important to know when something is a real problem, or just a small thing that doesn't really matter.

Before you take any action, ask yourself:

Was this something hurtful or frightening, or am I strong enough to move on and not be worried by it?

This is about behaviour that is not good. We don't say a person is rude or mean, we say that their behaviour is rude or mean. There is a big difference.

Attendance Targets

You may have read or heard the information about the government aiming to raise attendance rates back to where they were a few years ago.

It seems that nowadays the idea of attending school isn't as important for some as it used to be. This is a shame, as non-attendance at school can limit the possibilities for a child's future. It's a system thing; a day here and a day there can mount up, and become a pattern. This is especially true for Monday and Friday, which should be no different to any other day.

The government target for attendance is: **Seventy percent (70%) of pupils will be attending school for at least nine days out of ten every fortnight.**

How are we doing at Everglade School?

In Term Four of 2022 we had a total of only 46% of pupils attending for nine days out of ten. Ouch! That's not a good result.

While there are always good reasons for absence (sickness, urgent family situation etc) there are sometimes reasons given that fall into the 'unjustified absence' category. If we can reduce the number of unjustified absences, and lift the level of importance given to school, we will see a big change in our numbers. That means we are giving our tamariki more chances in life.

Everglade School Values

We have eight key values that drive the way we do things at Everglade School. It's important that these are not just 'nice words on paper' but something that influences how we go about our business. These values are for all those associated with the school, and determine the way we do things on site. This is for pupils, staff and families to all keep in common. Our values are:
