### **Carrying on the Attendance Theme**

You will have picked up on the fact that we are pushing this theme quite a bit. The reason for that is that we have dropped away a lot in recent years and we need to find our way forward again.

Evidence points to the fact that children who attend school regularly do better at school than when they don't. That seems obvious, because it is. What isn't so obvious is the way that "just one day" now and again adds up.

If you think about your own employment, if you were absent from work for one day per week over a period of time, **you would probably end up losing your job.** One day per week absence means 80% attendance, which is well below the target of 90% that is being set across the country. One day per week means 40 days per year. That's 20% of the school learning programme lost.



We recognise that society has become quite casual about a lot of things. Our suggestion is not to let school attendance become casual as well. Any more than four days absence per term will drop a child below the 90% target.

There will always be times when absence is unavoidable. Please give thought to any reasons why your child may be absent and ask yourself "Is the absence necessary?"

If we keep checking on ourselves we will- get back to where we want to be.
